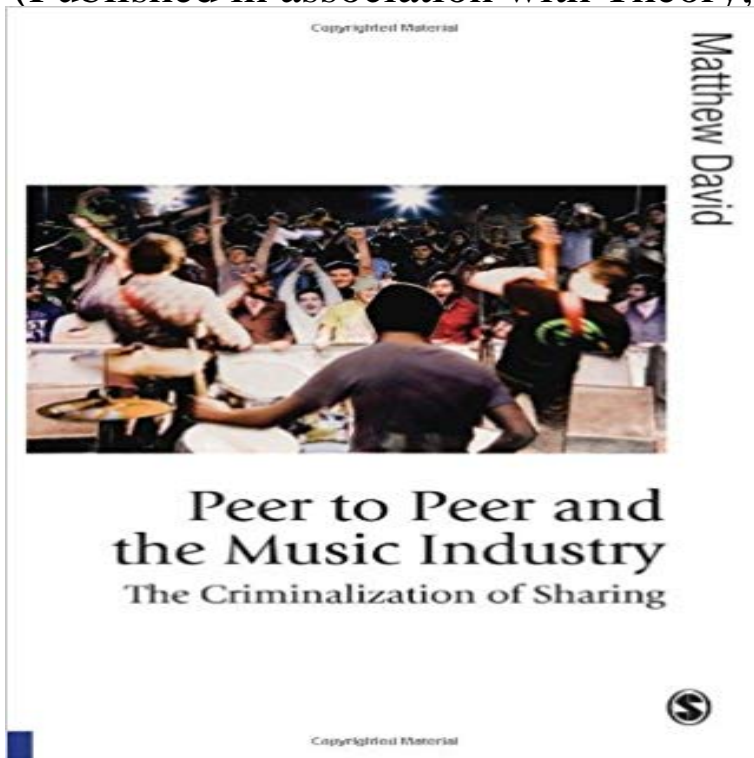


Peer to Peer and the Music Industry: The Criminalization of Sharing (Published in association with Theory, Culture & Society)
